National Employment and Education Survey (NEES) Public Use File

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PRESENTED TO: Lumina Foundation

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Study Overview

In the fall of 2015, the Lumina Foundation (Lumina) issued a grant to NORC at the University of Chicago (NORC) to conduct a national survey of adults titled the National Education and Employment Survey (NEES). The purpose of the NEES was to determine the percentage of adults in America who hold a high-quality certificate, license, or certification as their highest credential. The results of this effort would inform Lumina's objectives for its Goal 2025 initiative. Lumina —through Goal 2025—is committed to improving the nation's postsecondary education system by increasing the proportion of Americans with high-quality degrees, certificates, and other credentials to 60 percent by the year 2025. By ensuring access to higher-education opportunities after high school, more individuals will ultimately achieve a greater earning capacity, which in turn leads to better quality of life, stronger economies, and thriving communities, as well as a stronger nation overall.

Although there has been data available to understand how degree-based educational credentials (associate's degrees and higher) affect employment outcomes, there is little data that measure the prevalence of non-degree-based educational credentials such as certifications, licenses, and certificates and their impact on employment outcomes. In 2009, representatives from several federal organizations such as the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the National Science Foundation, and the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) formed a group that would ultimately develop a survey called the Adult Training and Education Survey (ATES), which is to be fielded by the NCES.² Lumina was a stakeholder in this survey and proposed using results from this study for their Goal 2025 initiative.

In order to obtain data for Lumina's 2016 Stronger Nation Report, NCES approved Lumina's request to field ATES survey items in a separate survey. NORC and Lumina collaborated to field selected ATES survey items and developed the sampling and methodological approaches for the effort. The NEES was administered in both web and telephone (Computer-assisted Telephone Interview, or CATI) modes over a six-week data collection period, surveying 1,890 respondents across the country between the ages of 25 and 64. Two respondents requested their data not be included, bringing the total number of respondents in the NEES PUF to 1,888 (see Data Processing).

This Public Use Data File (PUF) has been created to meet the goal for transparency and to ensure these data are available for further analysis. The following User's Guide provides critical information for researchers who wish to conduct analyses on the NEES data.

Sample Design

NORC employed a dual frame sample design selecting a nationally representative sample of adults between the ages of 25 to 64. A dual frame design involves two sampling frames (here named Frame A and Frame B), and a sample is selected independently from each frame. For this study, Frame A was the NORC National Frame, which is an address-based frame that covers the entire U.S. household population. Using this frame allowed the NEES to take advantage of NORC's AmeriSpeak panel, yielding the representative sample for Frame A. The Frame A sample was selected using sampling strata defined by age, race/ethnicity, education, and gender. The second frame, Frame B, was developed to ensure coverage of select minority populations. Frame B was derived from targeted lists from a sample vendor.

Questionnaire Overview

The English questionnaire for NEES is provided in Appendix A. A copy of the Spanish questionnaire is available upon request.

Survey items in the NEES were adopted from the ATES survey – a survey conducted by NCES. Between January and February 2016, the NEES asked a nationally representative sample of adults between the ages of 25 and 64 (see Sample Design section of this report) a total of 62 questions in the following topic areas:

- Education (highest level, field of study, etc.)
- Certifications and licenses (acquisition, type, preparation, etc.)
- Certificates (acquisition, type, preparation, etc.)
- Work experience programs (internships, residency, compensation, work experiences, etc.)
- Employment (jobs, full-/part-time status, job title, salary, etc.)
- Background (marital status, race/ethnicity, etc.)

Data Processing

Upon completion of the data collection effort, data were processed through several steps to create the final PUF.

Sampling Weights

NORC's sampling team created and applied sampling weights to each complete and partial case. (Partial cases were defined as having responses through Question 24). The NEES sample consisted of multiple components: the AmeriSpeak Panel sample, the Hispanic target sample, and the African American target sample. These components were first weighted separately to adjust for their respective selection probabilities, nonresponse, and frame coverage. They were then combined together to derive a unified data file with a single set of weights (FINAL WEIGHT).

Data users must use the sampling weights to calculate unbiased estimators of population parameters of interest. Unweighted analyses may be biased because different segments of the population may have very different selection probabilities and/or response rates.

Other processing edits

Some of the items in the surveys included open-ended or other specific questions. All open-ended responses were reviewed and backcoded into the existing code frame where possible. Q7 (What is the name of your most important certificate or license?) used a two-stage coding approach initially applying the National Survey of College Graduates (NSCG) certification codes³ at Stage 1, followed by a combination of NSCG and ATES Pilot Study⁴ frames for broad category grouping at Stage 2. NORC applied a two-stage process for Q8 (What kind of work is your most important certification or license used for?) and Q48 (What kind of business or industry was this?). Both questions used the Census 2012 Industry code frame⁵.

The Lumina Foundation and NORC maintain strict confidentiality standards for their survey respondents. NEES survey respondents were notified in advance of the creation of the Public Use File (PUF) and given

the opportunity to opt out of having their data included; two respondents responded to this notification, and requested their data not be included. The data for these two cases has been removed from the PUF file, bringing the total number of respondents in the NEES PUF to 1,888. Furthermore, data in the PUF have been treated to protect the privacy of survey respondents and minimize disclosure risk. See "Limitations" in the Analysis section below for more information.

Analysis

Data from the NEES Public Use File (PUF) can be used for a variety of analyses concerning the education and employment of the U.S. population in the target age range. The NEES captured data on non-degree based education credentials such as certifications, licenses, and certificates and their impact on employment outcomes. Specifically, the data can be utilized to look at those with a high-quality certificate, license, or certification as their highest credential.

Users should note that numbers from the NEES published by the Lumina Foundation may be based on the final restricted version of the data and so will not exactly match data pulled from the PUF. Differences are attributable to the survey data being removed for two respondents (see above section on processing edits), and changes involved in the disclosure risk treatment (see below). Although exact numbers may not match, the restricted NEES data and the NEES PUF allow users to draw the same inferences in most cases. The only exceptions may be in some utility and reliability loss for select, recoded and/or suppressed variables (see below section on data limitations).

Disclosure Risk Treatment and Data Limitations

The Lumina Foundation and NORC maintain strict confidentiality standards for their survey respondents. Data in the PUF have been treated to protect the privacy of survey respondents and minimize disclosure risk. For the purposes of this PUF, disclosure risk is defined by the number of observations that share common values with Identifying Variables (IV), variables that are assumed to be known to outside parties that could be used to identify and learn information about a respondent. Variables capturing responses to the following survey questions were determined to be Identifying: Q1, Q2, Q53, Q54, Q55, Q56, Q57, Q58, Q59, Q60, Q61, and were treated for disclosure risk.

The primary treatment methods used were Global Recoding and Local Suppression. Global recoding is the operation where variables are redefined to be less specific for the purpose of making some cases less identifiable. Local suppression is the practice of suppressing the value of a given variable for a subset of cases for the purpose of making them less identifiable. Suppressed values were recoded to missing values. Recoding was preferred to suppression as it results in a file that is more inferable to the analyst, but suppression is often required for some observations.

Minimum Equivalency Class Threshold

A minimum equivalency class size is chosen to ensure that an individual cannot be uniquely identified by their IV profile. Larger equivalency class sizes provide more protection by introducing more uncertainty

to the re-identification process. In cases where it is likely that an intruder may know of a target's presence in the data an equivalency class size of 10 or more would be recommended. For the NEES, it was determined to be highly unlikely that an intruder would know of a participant's participation in the survey or presence in the data. An equivalency class size of 3 was selected.

Recoding

Recoding was used as a method to increase equivalency class size and thus prevent suppression. Multiple recoded versions of the IVs allow observations to be in the most specifically defined equivalency class possible, given the number of similar observations in the data. Recoding affected the following PUF Identifying Variables:

Recommendations

Users are cautioned against drawing conclusions from analyses using variables with large proportions of "Missing or suppressed" values. Inference of these groups is not reliable since distributions of nonsuppressed values are not necessarily retained after suppression. Users who want to use analyses for drawing conclusions about the data are encouraged to only use variables with no suppression. In most cases, multiple versions of a treated variable are available, and users are encouraged to use the version with coarser aggregations but a smaller proportion of "Missing or suppressed" values. Two recoded variables have versions with no suppression: Q1 RC2 and Q59 RC2. Variables with less recoding but

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greater suppression are provided for users who are especially interested in a variable subset which is otherwise recoded.

For analyses using Identifying Variables that have been recoded and/or suppressed, users should reference the codebook for details on each variable.
