Medicaid and CHIP

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Expanding Access to Health Insurance Coverage

Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) provide health insurance coverage to more than 80 million individuals who would otherwise be unable to afford health care. The Affordable Care Act (ACA) includes many provisions designed to expand Medicaid and CHIP eligibility, including an extension of coverage to nondisabled adults with incomes at or below 138 percent of the federal poverty level; simplified methodologies for determining eligibility; and streamlined processes designed to support seamless coordination across health insurance programs. The law also places an increased emphasis on clinical preventive services. As a result of these provisions, Medicaid and CHIP programs will play an even more integral role in improving access to the health and care of low-income Americans.

Sample Projects

Financial Alignment Initiative Operations Support. High-quality, cost-effective support for dual-eligible Medicare-Medicaid participants is a priority for the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). NORC and its partners work closely with CMS to support the implementation of state demonstration programs that are testing new approaches to providing integrated, high-quality care to the dual-eligible population using either a capitated or managed fee-for-service program model. NORC conducts readiness assessments of demonstration states and health plans, monitors states' and health plans' progress, educates stakeholders and consumers on the demonstrations, tracks and analyzes public comments, and provides project management expertise.

Section 1115 Demonstration and Evaluation. NORC is supporting the development of consistent evaluation designs to facilitate the assessment of CMS' Section 1115 Demonstration Programs, with a focus on Delivery System Reform Incentive Payment plans. These waivers offer states added flexibility to foster changes in health care delivery designed to result in better care for individuals, better population health, and cost containment. This support includes guidance on data collection, analysis, and reporting requirements to ensure that states conduct scientifically valid evaluations and can issue periodic progress reports. The NORC team recommends evaluation topic areas and reviews and assesses states' draft evaluation reports. Finally, the NORC team is developing a centralized database to track and manage states' waiver requirements and deliverables.

Nationwide Adult Medicaid Consumer Assessment of Healthcare Providers and Systems (CAHPS) Survey. This survey, sponsored by CMS, is the first of its kind and is intended to capture baseline national and state-level estimates of adult Medicaid enrollees' experiences with the health care system beginning in 2014. NORC and its partner, the Thoroughbred Research Group, will sample approximately 1.5 million Medicaid beneficiaries nationwide. This project will provide CMS with uniform national figures on the health care experiences and related impressions of the Medicaid population. It will also give CMS comparable information for beneficiaries in all states across different program models. Results from this work will inform the development of standard measures anchoring a robust health care quality strategy for the adult Medicaid population.

Interim and Final Reports to Congress on the Community First Choice (CFC)

Option. NORC is evaluating the implementation of the CFC Option, a Medicaid state plan benefit introduced in the ACA that covers home and community-based services and supports (HCBS) for beneficiaries with long-term care needs. NORC is conducting interviews and sites visits and analyzing Medicaid claims data to examine states' CFC implementation plans and progress, the impact of the CFC Option on individuals receiving HCBS attendant care, and the cost of care for beneficiaries receiving long-term services and supports. This study and the Reports to Congress that it generates will provide policymakers and program administrators with a more-thorough understanding of new HCBS options, states' decision-making processes, and what conditions are necessary to ensure the financial and logistic viability of the CFC program in particular.
